





Several factors go into picking a place for the event. Of course, the top priority is cost and we took that prize for the 55th with a \$20 fee for the Meet & Greet loaded with appetizers and the 3-Meat Saturday night banquet and the \$99 hotel fee, and having done this for years for special events, believe me, this was beyond a bargain.

Several of the requests that we had the travelers wished to stay and have the event at one location. That pretty much limits us in Joplin as we have two choices, the Holiday Inn and the Downstream Casino & Resort which is run by the Quapaw Nation. I met with them for the 55th and not even close to the cost of the Holiday Inn and things may be different in 2022, we shall see. The old Holiday Inn that was to become a Hilton Doubletree facility sunk as it was requiring more investment monies that what the group from Kansas City wanted to invest in. So idle it has set for about five years and has been placed on the market for sale. Who knows what that may bring in two years' time.

We also realize that there are other places that are available for the event and like the Elks Club and they have food preparation or you can rent a hall like the Scottish Rite temple, but then all your food and drinks are catered in and that ain't cheap. I am thinking that later this summer we will rally the committee and set a low-cost game plan than may just shock the world.

We would like to remind you that we still have the Class Directory and the 55th DVD for sale and it may be purchased for \$12 and send to our class treasurer Stephanie White Everitt at 2821 Wisconsin, Joplin, MO 64804.
