Great Trivia

A SHOT OF WHISKEY' - In the old west a .45 cartridge for a six-gun cost 12 cents, so did a glass of whiskey. If a cowhand was low on cash, he would often give the bartender a cartridge in exchange for a drink. This became known as a "shot" of whiskey.

BUYING THE FARM - This is synonymous with dying. During WW1 soldiers were given life insurance policies worth \$5,000. This was about the price of an average farm so if you died you "bought the farm" for your survivors.

IRON CLAD CONTRACT - This came about from the ironclad ships of the Civil War. It meant something so strong it could not be broken.

RIFF RAFF - The Mississippi River was the main way of traveling from north to south. Riverboats carried passengers and freight but they were expensive so most people used rafts. Everything had the right of way over rafts which were considered cheap. The steering oar on the rafts was called a "riff" and this transposed into riff-raft, meaning low class.

COBWEB - The Old English word for "spider" was "cob".

SHIP STATE ROOMS - Traveling by steamboat was considered the height of comfort. Passenger cabins on the boats were not numbered. Instead they were named after states. To this day cabins on ships are called staterooms.

SLEEP TIGHT- Early beds were made with a wooden frame. Ropes were tied across the frame in a crisscross pattern. A straw mattress was then put on top of the ropes. Over time the ropes stretched, causing the bed to sag. The owner would then tighten the ropes to get a better night's sleep.

SHOWBOAT - These were floating theaters built on a barge that was pushed by a steamboat. These played small towns along the Mississippi River. Unlike the boat shown in the movie "Showboat", these did not have an engine. They were gaudy and attention grabbing which is why we say someone who is being the life of the party is "showboating".

OVER A BARREL - In the days before CPR, a drowning victim would be placed face down over a barrel and the barrel would be rolled back and forth in an effort to empty the lungs of water. It was rarely effective. If you are over a barrel, you are in deep trouble.

BARGE IN - Heavy freight was moved along the Mississippi in large barges pushed by steamboats. These were hard to control and would sometimes swing into piers or other boats. People would say they "barged in".

In 1965 I went to Moller Barber College in Kansas City. After working at the Club Barber shop on 4th St. in Joplin for 2 years making \$75 on a good week, a friend, Ray Brown, then asked if I would be interested in selling mobile homes for \$200 per week plus commission, a car and expenses. Needless to say my barber days were over!!!

After relocating from Anderson in 1955, my schooling in Joplin began at Lafayette Grade School, where I lived across the street at 1822 Connor. I then spent one year at South Junior High before we moved to 2814 East 16th Street where I attended East Junior High. Then on to Joplin Senior High School. I wasn't the best student & I spent too much time at Nina's Green Parrott in Galena.

From 1967 to 1970 I helped open up 75 mobile home franchises for Brown Enterprises and ended up with two of my own one in Grove, OK and Miami, OK.

Valerie Putnam, class of '63, and I were married in 1967. Her parents owned Burl's Dairy Crème on South Main and they had the best footlong chili dogs and fresh cut curly fries. After our marriage ended, Valerie and I remained friends and she and her husband David, would meet me in Daytona Beach Florida for the Daytona 500 in 1992, 93, 94 & 95 and stay with me,. They lived in South Florida.

After a short time in Salinas, CA, in 1971 I moved to Maui, Hawaii to sell cars for Valley Isle Ford and run their used car operation. In 1973, my neighbor and I bought the ALII AMC Jeep Dealership in Maui. We sold it after 2 years to the owners of Valley Isle Ford. After moving to Oahu for a brief time, I then decided to move back to Missouri to be closer to family.

In 1975 when I got back to Joplin, thinking about my next endeavor, I found that some of my old friends were in the asphalt business. Tom Brookshire asked me to come work with him in the business and I said "Are you crazy? That's hard, dirty work!" At that point in my life I had never been involved in manual labor, but I decided to try it for a while. The realization soon hit me that I enjoyed the business, but wanted to continue in a warmer, booming economic area, so off to Houston, TX it was!

In Houston, I started out in asphalt, but soon got into concrete and excavation, initially with a couple of guys and myself and grew it to 123 employees with 75 pieces

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of excavation equipment. During this time I set up a Asphalt Plant in Lowell Arkansas in 1987 & sold it in 89. I sold the parent company in Houston in 1996 and moved to Florida for a couple of years.

At that point, Kevin Brookshire, Tom's son, asked me to come to Dallas to help him grow his asphalt & concrete business., which I did. That is where I met the love of my life, Lyla, and decided to start a contracting company, specializing in building new car dealerships. We were married on February 10, 2001.

While living in Irving, TX, a suburb of Dallas, I became friends with Roger Jameson, the twin brother of Dr. Phil's wife, Robin. This was prior to his climb to fame as a result of the Oprah beef trial. When Oprah contacted Dr. Phil to assist in jury selection for her beef trial, his company, Courtroom Sciences, conducted a "mock" trial and my wife, Lyla was asked to sit on that jury for 3 days, meeting Oprah and Gail King. We attended Dr. Phil and Robin's enormous Christmas party at their home for two years before their move to California..

We moved to Grand Lake, OK and slowed down a bit. We started playing poker at the Grand Lake Casino and traveled quite a bit in our Motorhome. One winter we were in Florida for warmer weather, and it snowed, how lucky is that!

We spent a lot of time in Las Vegas playing poker, now, in Idaho, we're only 40 miles from Jackpot, Nevada, where we play.

Lyla's father lived in Idaho, where we would visit him and we both agreed that's where we'd like to live one day. We made the move in 2012 to take care of him. After watching T.V. with my father in law in the afternoons, General Hospital and Gunsmoke, I knew I had to get back to work.

We started a decorative concrete business in 2013 and are still going strong. I have crews working in 8 states installing decorative concrete. Check out our website to see what we do: www.mountainwestconcrete.com.

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Note: There are many more stories I could tell, but two stick out in my mind. Around 1969 I was in Atlanta, GA at a gas station at 8 am when Larry Don Williams and his band pulled in!

In 1973 I ran into Kenny Wendell, class of 63, in Hawaii and we hung out for a couple days! It's a small world sometimes!

Local homeless, displaced Ukrainians focus of church fundraisers

First Community Church in Jo-plin has launched two fundraisers that will benefit the local homeless population at Soul's Harbor and people overseas who are being im-

people overseas wind are being in pacted by the war in Ukraine.
On Sunday, First Community is planning a pancake breakfast for Ukraine from 9 to 10 a.m. in Fellowship Hall, 2007 E. 15th St. Donations will be accepted. The event is open to the public

Proceeds from the breakfast will be matched by Church World Service, a faith-based organization transforming communities around the globe through just and sustain-able responses to hunger, poverty, displacement and disaster.

"We'll be accepting voluntary donations, and then we have a charnonauons, and then we have a char-itable trust that's going to match all of the donations, dollar for dollar," said Pastor Russell Willoughby. "I'm not sure what to expect, but I know

our people are very generous." Church World Service has welcomed Ukrainian refugees to the United States for over a decade as part of its efforts to address the global refugee crisis, in which more than 84.6 million people are considered

84.6 million people are considered displaced, according to its website. "We all have heard the tragedies that are taking place and all of the suffering," said Willoughby. "People are being displaced. I had church members asking me if I had any ideas or ways to donate to Ukraine because there are a lot of groups. because there are a lot of groups that solicit donations that may or may not be the best. I knew that we were involved with Church World Service. I thought why don't we do a fundraiser here and that way, it's easier for everyone to come together and do it as a sign of solidarity from our church.

The second fundraiser is called "Undies Sunday" in which church members have been donating packs of new underwear, socks, under-shirts and other garments since March 27 for the local homeless pop-

ulation.
Stephanie Everitt, a church member, said she got the idea from the congregation of First United Methods. odist Church in Carthage, which donated 284 pairs of socks, 273 pairs of underwear and 27 T-shirts to Souls Harbor in January

Harbor in January.
"I thought, 'You know, that might be a really good program for our church to do,' so I put it before the church board, and they were all very enthusiastic about it," she said. "I set up two receptacles, and this will be our last Sunday that we will be collecting for it"." lecting for it.'

Everitt said she's received a tre mendous amount of support for the project and hopes to do another one again in the future. As of Monday, she had over 90 pairs of underwear that she'll deliver to Souls Harbor

"I expect to receive more this coming Sunday," she said. "Our church is always looking for things to do for the community.'
