# May 22, 2011 Followup

May 22, 2017 was the sixth anniversary of the tornado that ravaged our hometown. It was a storm that lasted 38 minutes but forever changed the landscape and the lives of our town and of the people who experienced it. 7,000 homes were destroyed and 158 lives were lost. What follows is a tribute to the bravery, resilience and tenacity of those who called Joplin home.

Professor Marvel's weather prediction and the mesmerizing image of the black funnel cloud churning up the Kansas landscape in the opening scenes of the movie "The Wizard of Oz" was my only encounter with the power of a "twister."

Although I grew up, smack dab in the middle of "tornado alley" in Joplin, MO in the 1950s and '60s, the closest I got to a tornado was sitting in front of the TV screen watching the annual network viewing of "The Wizard of Oz".

I've always believed that there are spiritual nuggets galore in the MGM classic from 1939 that are a subtext to the surface story line and the celluloid characters that inhabit the black-and-white starkness of the Kansas plains and the colorful fantasy world of Oz.

Looking back from the vantage point of adulthood, there were lessons for me from the movie about having the power to create our own heart's desire, the necessity of having loving companions on our journey, and that, in the end, home and the people we love are our true destination and foundation.

And, most importantly, that what we're looking for is within—not "out there" somewhere.

The tornado that struck Joplin was not created on a Hollywood sound stage but was a real life EF-5 storm that created havoc, devastation, death and destruction in the hometown of my youth. For the residents of Joplin, the lessons from the aftermath of the real thing are gut wrenching and personal.

The true remnants of the aftermath of the tornado repeat with stunning regularity: heroism on a city-wide scale, a grit and tenacity and resilience in the face of devastating personal loss that has captured the admiration of people all across the country.

As I found myself watching, again from my TV screen, what transpired in my hometown—I was overwhelmed with a sense of pride in Joplin, and its citizens, in the face of a real-life "whopper" of a storm.

There really is no place like home.

They are all very active, the boys in sports, and our granddaughter with showing her horse. She took top honors at the Houston Stock Show and Rodeo this past winter.

With all of this, projects, woodwork, golf, and trying to get a sequel to my first book written, I find myself scratching my head and wondering "When did I ever have time to work?"

I hope everyone from JHS '64 is doing well and enjoying life. Look forward to seeing all in 2019.


#### Six Undeniable Facts of Life:


